While I was photographing bears in a meadow in Minnesota, this black bear walked slowly closer and closer to me until we were separated by only a few yards. I spent quite some time photographing and observing this bear. The bear approached me, I didn't approach the bear. He was curious and showed no fear of me, so I felt at ease to reciprocate. Do animals sense fear or danger? I think they do. Maybe the Golden Rule applies to more than human interactions.
